## Donors Can Be Leaders, Too!

The OutCenter recently launched a new initiative to secure and grow a circle of annual donors that can help the organization succeed over the next few years.

Gaining support from donors as leaders has the largest growth potential for this organization, understanding that donors can be leaders, too, because of their very intentional commitment to growing and nurturing this one-of-a-kind organization in Berrien County, and only 1 of 7 such centers serving the entire State of Michigan.

And most are wanting to be a leadership donor because they want to be a part of solving the larger issues LGBT people and their families face in Southwest Michigan...at the least.

These folks are contributors to the OutCenter, certainly, but they also are helping spread the word about the great value and impact the OutCenter is having through its programs. And they want to spread that word to their families, friends, colleagues and the larger communities in which they are a part.

## The OutCenter's Goal for this initiative in 2015: \$80,000!

Of that amount, 21 donors will contribute about \$37,000, and 260 donors will more than match that amount by donating \$43,000.

We've already launched the appeal for the first stage and have 11 of 21 donors committed.

The panel was organized by an alliance of Holland is Ready, PFLAG Holland/Lakeshore and Holland Area PRIDE. This alliance is in the planning stage of opening a resource center in Holland to serve the LGBT community.

**Meeting with Representative Al Pscholka attended by 30; more work to do with elected officials**



Representative Al Pscholka met with LGBT community members on April 13 to have a candid conversation about LGBT people and their families living and working in Southwest Michigan.

The conversation was facilitated by Brian Savage, outgoing Board Chair of the OutCenter, now holding the position as an OutCenter Ambassador.


Saying to a reporter afterward that it was "one of the most respectful, open and honest dialogues I have had," Pscholka did commit to supporting inclusion of LGBT people in Michigan's Elliot-Larsen Civil Rights Act. He added this provision, however: that he would also support the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA).

The OutCenter remains committed to bringing equality home to Southwest Michigan. Part of that work includes educating everyone including elected officials about how legislation such as RFRA negatively impacts the community we serve: LGBT people and their families living and working in Southwest Michigan.

RFRA is a law that would allow for religious exemptions. We understand that freedom of religion is important to many and is already protected in both the United States and Michigan Constitutions.

We believe RFRA in Michigan will provide people an opportunity to deny LGBT people and their families services. That is why the OutCenter wants everyone to know that RFRA is bad for LGBT people and their families in Southwest Michigan.

The OutCenter will continue to provide opportunities to have conversations with elected officials and others about these and other topics.



The purpose of this event was to seek advice on both organizational structure and programs, as well as discuss lessons learned in various stages of organizational development. Panelists included Jay Maddock, Executive Director, Kalamazoo Gay Lesbian Resource Center, Mira Krishnan, CEO, The Network, Matthew Downey, Program Director of Nonprofit Services, The Johnson Center for Philanthropy, Grand Valley State University (GSU), Colette Beighley, Director of the LGBT center at GVSU, and Mary Jo Schnell, Interim Executive Director of the OutCenter.

Moderators of the event were Jen Adams, co-chair of Holland is Ready and Tom Dula, chairman of Holland Area PRIDE.

The conversation was full of ideas and insights, and also provided a great opportunity for these organizations and efforts to establish an ongoing commitment to collaborate, learn from each other, and increase our overall capacity to serve Michiganders. It was truly a great conversation and many expressed a desire to have additional conversations, building larger and healthier whole communities where LGBT people and their families are welcomed and respected without discrimination.
